

The developer intends to file plans on the day I'm writing this letter; if that happens they will be reviewed by the Planning Commission on May 23rd. The proposed structure fits within the ADU guidelines an SVCA committee recommended last year, but I encourage interested parties to submit comments.

The officers of SVCA made a decision to not offer Bucky Books any more as a membership option because we didn't sell many and there are many other sources. We have also set up meeting dates for the rest of the year - May 12, August 18, November 17, all at Bethany Church.

There is a Midtown Police Station update meeting on April 14th (the day after I'm writing). The designers and police dept. have incorporated community concerns into the general site plans and I hope they will continue this trend as they move into the exterior and landscaping design phase. The next meeting on May 12 will review the social events over the summer—Make Music Madison, July 4th, Ice Cream Social, and garage sale. If you have any suggestions for topics, let me know.

Newly elected SVCA President, **Sue Reynard**, presided over the March 7, 2016 quarterly meeting, which was attended by around 23 people. Sue presented her State of the SVCA and distributed a survey to gauge interest in neighborhood volunteering.

Treasurer Brian Andersen reported that the SVCA bank account balance is \$7,124. There are currently around 70 paid-up SVCA members, at \$15 for a yearly membership. In comparison, Westmorland has 500 members. Discussion followed about how to attract more members, how to make it easier to sign up, how to get more people involved.

Other topics of discussion included the Midtown Police Station, Friends of Hoyt Park, Owen Drive rain gardens, crimes of opportunity, road construction projects, emerald ash borer in Sunset Park, SVCA co-sponsorship of the Westmorland July 4 celebration.

Josh Arnold, newly re-elected as SVCA secretary, has resigned due to other commitments. **Anne Badey Raffa** has graciously stepped in as secretary until the next election. Thanks, Josh, for a great job with meeting notes, the Facebook page, the Hillside block parties, Sunset Village beer glasses, and everything else you've done.

North Meadow Lane Accessory Dwelling Unit Proposed

Melanie Ramey of 217 N. Meadow would like to construct an accessory dwelling structure in her backyard to care for her disabled brother. Her contractor is Todd Seiler, NextStep Building & Design LLC, Blue Mounds, WI. Ms. Ramey and Mr. Seiler hope to have their proposal heard and approved at the May 23 Planning Commission public meeting; they are also working with direct neighbors to see if they have any issues. The proposed structure is 480 sq. ft, single story, with a 4 ft. porch.

SVCA President, Sue Reynard, wrote Todd Seiler, referring to a report that SVCA submitted last year to City zoning staff requesting changes in the ADU ordinances, “At least in terms of square footage, Ms. Ramey’s proposal fits within the requested guideline (which is smaller than the original city guidelines). I don’t know about the height and setbacks, but if your project meets those requirements as well, then you’re not only meeting the city guidelines but the requested neighborhood guidelines.”

Alder Tim Gruber writes, “The Plan Commission will approve or reject the Conditional Use Permit. There will be plenty of time for neighbors and the neighborhood to state support, opposition, or comment prior to and at the Plan Commission public hearing. My position is that because of the small size of this ADU and its location in the rear yard, it will fit with the neighborhood and should not be controversial.”

As with Sunset Village’s two previous ADUs, the applicant will post a yellow Notice of Hearing sign on the property at least 21 days prior to the public hearing. Comments should be directed to the City of Madison Planning Commission. Please cc SVCA President Sue Reynard, so she can keep track of the neighborhood's responses.

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Mid-Town Police Station Neighborhood Meeting

Madison Police Department representatives and architects, Enberg Anderson, presented an update on the Mid-Town Police Station project (located at the site of the former Mt. Olive Lutheran Church) on Thursday, April 14, at Our Lady Queen of Peace Church. This meeting provided an opportunity for residents to hear about the project, ask questions and provide input. Designers presented preliminary site plans and the first external renderings.

Points of interest include:

- The big tree near the corner of Mineral Point and Westmorland will be saved.
- The project will restore the native slope and grade, which was raised to accommodate one of the church entrances.
- Landscape design calls for native plantings in front, including grasses and redbud trees.
- Lighting will be Night Sky compliant.
- The design includes bioswales for storm water.

UW-Madison Campus Master Plan

The UW-Madison is in the process of updating its Master Plan. Once the plan is completed and approved by the Madison Common Council (tentatively scheduled for November), the plan will serve as the guiding document for zoning under the Campus Institutional district in the City of Madison's zoning code. Community Gardens in Rennebohm Park

The Sheboygan Community Gardens, formerly located on State property at the Department of Transportation at Hill Farms, has been approved by the city for a permanent garden located to the east of the tennis courts in Rennebohm Park. The garden in Rennebohm will be about one-third the size of the former garden on the DOT site. The City, Sheboygan Gardens, and Community Groundworks are in the process of finding permanent location(s), including and in addition to the Rennebohm site that will be developed this year, that will be equal to or greater than the amount of land and plots that the garden had at the DOT site.

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It's Back-Garlic Mustard in Quarry and Hoyt Parks

Garlic mustard is starting to grow in our parks and woods. Garlic mustard is a biennial herb that invades and spreads rapidly in wooded areas, such as Quarry Park; the DNR terms it "ecologically invasive." Garlic mustard is most easily recognized when it blooms in early May, and is controlled or eradicated by pulling in April and May, before it goes to seed. It can be identified by its cluster of small white flowers at the top and its round toothed leaves. If your yard backs onto Quarry or Hoyt Park, please help by pulling the garlic mustard in your purview—and don't pile brush over garlic mustard stands! And anywhere you live, please pull garlic mustard in your yard—the small seeds are spread into our natural areas on our shoes, bike tires, or dogs' paws. If you let your dog off-leash in Quarry Park, you bear an obligation to pull some of the garlic mustard that Fido spreads off the paths. Plants should be pulled getting the entire root and then bagged for disposal; un-bagged plants may still form seed from the flowers. 2014 Hillcrest Drive Shooter Sentenced to Prison

Sean Z. Watkins, 23, was convicted of armed robbery, first-degree reckless endangerment, and theft for the November 10, 2014 shooting of Jamal Scott in the 3900 block of Hillcrest Drive. He was sentenced in March to seven years in prison and five years of extended supervision. Watkins and two other men had gone to the Hillcrest home to steal money and marijuana, and Watkins shot Scott as he tried to flee; the bullet went through Scott's arm and into his abdomen. In April 2015 Jamal Scott and another man were arrested on suspicion of armed invasions of three west Madison homes, one in Westmorland, another in Hill Farms. According to MPD Captain Victor Wahl, the two men have been charged with multiple offenses, but the cases are still open.

On April 13 the University of Wisconsin-Madison held its fifth in a series of public open houses regarding the 2015 Campus Master Plan Update project. The master plan team presented the revised preliminary plan, which focuses on the vision and broad recommendations organized around the Master Plan's six major goals: **supporting the university's mission; managing resources; celebrating the lake side setting; making travel easy; revitalizing outdoor spaces; and being good neighbors.**

"We are very excited to share our developing plans for the future of the campus's physical environment with the broader campus community, especially the campus landscape and storm water management recommendations," says Gary Brown, director of Campus Planning & Landscape Architecture. "This is a great time to offer your input and thoughts on the draft Campus Master Plan and we welcome everyone's involvement."
